



Colossians 1:3-7

Thanksgiving and Prayer


³ We always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, when we pray for you, 4 since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, 5 because of the hope laid up for you in heaven. Of this you have heard before in the word of the truth, the gospel, ⁶ which has come to you, as indeed in the whole world it is bearing fruit and increasing—as it also does among you, since the day you heard it and understood the grace of God in truth, ⁷ just as you learned it from Epaphras our beloved fellow servant. He is a faithful minister of Christ on your behalf 8 and has made known to us your love in the Spirit.



 Colossae was about 100 miles east of Ephesus, in the Lycus River valley near Laodicea and Hierapolis in Asia Minor (Turkey).

Overview

- Colossians is one of the apostle Paul's "prison epistles." Along with Ephesians, Philippians, and Philemon, it was written about A.D. 60-62 during Paul's first imprisonment in Rome, recorded in Acts 28.
- Though he had never
 visited the church, he had
 heard about them through
 his protégé Epaphras.
- What Paul heard gives us a clue to three things that happen to someone when they accept Christ.



- Paul opens his letter to the Colossians by thanking God for what their Gospel is doing in their lives.
- Paul also said that same Gospel was bearing fruit in all the world, so whatever it was doing in their lives, it will do in ours!

What happens when the Gospel comes to you?

- In the ESV, Verses 3-8 are translated as three English sentences.
- In the Greek NT they form a single 102-word sentence.

1. The Gospel brings us to a saving faith in Jesus Christ.

³ We always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, when we pray for you, ⁴ since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, ⁵ because of the hope laid up for you in heaven.

We are saved by our faith in Christ.

Ephesians 2:8

For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God.

We also live by faith.

Romans 1:17

¹⁷ For in the gospel a righteousness from God is revealed, a righteousness that is by faith from first to last, just as it is written: "The righteous will live by faith."

 Faith views everything in life in relation to God.


Their faith, love, and hope come from the Gospel, which bears fruit and increases.

Of this you have heard before in ^jthe word of the truth, the gospel, ⁶ which has come to you,

as indeed ^kin the whole world it is ^lbearing fruit and increasing—

Sub-Point as it also does among you, since the day you ^mheard it and understood ⁿthe grace of God in truth,

- Dallas Willard gives a wonderful definition of faith: "To believe something is to act as if it were so."
- The challenge of the Christian life is not getting people to do what they believe.
- It's getting them to
 really believe what they
 say they believe.





If you *believed* that this building was on fire, no one would have to *persuade* or *pressure* you into getting out.

In the rest of Colossians, Paul will give their faith plenty to do.

Put On the New Self

3 bIf then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, deserted at the right hand of God. 2 eSet your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. 3 For fyou have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. 4 When Christ who is your life happears, then you also will appear with him in glory.

desire, and covetousness, "which is idolatry. ⁶ On account of these the wrath of God is coming. ³ 7 PIn these you too once walked, when you were living in them. ⁸ But now ^qyou must put them all away: ^ranger, wrath, malice, ^sslander, and obscene talk from your mouth. ⁹ Do not lie to one another, seeing that "you have put off" the old self with its practices ¹⁰ and "have put on "the new self, "which is being renewed in knowledge "after the image of "its creator." ¹¹ Here there is not Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave, ⁵ free; but Christ is ^call, and in all.

¹² dPut on then, as ^eGod's chosen ones, holy and beloved, ^fcompassionate hearts, ^gkindness, ^hhumility, meekness, and patience, ¹³ hearing with one another and, ⁱif one has a complaint against another, ^gforgiving each other; ^gas the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. ¹⁴ And above all these put on ^jlove, which ^kbinds everything together in ^lperfect harmony. ¹⁵ And let ^mthe peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called ⁿin one body. And ^obe thankful. ¹⁶ Let ^pthe word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, ^gsinging psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, ^rwith thankfulness in your hearts to God. ¹⁷ And ^swhatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, ^tgiving thanks to God the Father through him.

2. The Gospel gives us a love that looks outward to others.

³ We always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, when we pray for you, ⁴ since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, ⁵ because of the hope laid up for you in heaven.

 Love is listed as the first fruit of the Spirit.

Galatians 5:22-23

²² But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, ²³ gentleness and self-control.

 Jesus said that our love for one another was the true mark of our being his followers.

John 13:34-35

3. The Gospel reorients all of life to a hope that is laid up heaven.

³ We always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, when we pray for you, ⁴ since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, ⁵ because of the hope laid up for you in heaven.

- The Christian hope not just a vague wish, but a confident expectation.
- The assurance of forgiveness and salvation.
- The fact of an eternal life.
- Becoming full partakers of the divine nature and life of Christ.





1 John 3:1–2

- There is a sense in which the hope laid up for us in heaven is already at work in the lives of believers.
- God's immeasurable power works in the present life of the believer from our conversion until we reach our final perfected state.

Colossians 3:1-4

If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. ² Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. ³ For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. 4 When Christ who is your life appears, then you also will appear with him in glory.

- Your real life is now hidden with Christ in God?
- So, where is that?
- Colossians 3 says Christ is "above"—in heaven.
- A parallel passage in Ephesians says that after God raised Christ from the dead, he "seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, ²¹ far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the one to come. ²² And he put all things under his feet .

—Ephesians 1:19-22

"Under his feet"

- In ancient times, the foot represented the power exercised by a person.
- A subject addressed himself to the feet of the mighty or the superior.
- A conquering king placed his foot on the neck of his defeated enemy.
- God has exalted Christ and placed all power in him, placing the whole created universe, including enemies, in subjection to him.



The next time you feel overwhelmed by anything, remember: Whatever is over your head is under his feet!

Ephesians 2:4–7

⁴ But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, 5 even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved— ⁶ and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, 7 so that in the coming ages he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus.

Where I live and where I work are real places.





But there is some deep and real way that am also here: "seated with him in the heavenly places."



Application

Do people thank God for you?

Colossians 1:3

³ We always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, when we pray for you.

Colossians 1:4

- Paul had never met the Colossian Christians (2:1).
- And when he writes this letter, he's in Rome, a thousand miles from Colossae.
- So how did he know about their faith, love and hope?
- It was worth talking about.

 Is the Gospel bearing fruit in your life?

Colossians 1:6

All over the world this gospel is bearing fruit and growing, just as it has been doing among you since the day you heard it and understood God's grace in all its truth.

Does your faith in Christ make a difference?

When you accept the Gospel, you receive a saving faith in Jesus Christ, a love that looks outward to others, and the complete reorientation of your life to a hope that is laid up in heaven.

 Willard's definition
 of faith: "To believe
 something is to act
 as if it were so."
- The challenge of the Christian life is really believing what you say you believe.
